Communication Matters - Hearing and Language

“Smart Talk” from your Board Speech-Language Pathologists

Early identification of a hearing impairment is critical to a child's overall language development and speech intelligibility, factors that will play a significant role in the child's ability to socialize, as well as to succeed in school. An estimated 10 - 15% of all school-aged children have some type of hearing loss. While some children are born with a hearing problem, others can develop hearing loss as a result of frequent ear infections, infectious diseases like measles, chicken pox, meningitis, or flu, head injury, and exposure to loud noise or music. Most children with hearing impairments can develop good oral language skills that are not substantially different than those of their hearing peers if: the hearing loss is diagnosed before the child is 6 months old;

intervention begins immediately; the child is appropriately fitted with hearing aids when necessary. A team approach, involving audiologists, speech-language pathologists, classroom teachers and teachers with special training in the education of children with hearing impairments, throughout a student's school years will assist him/her in meeting success in school. Many children with acquired hearing loss, including those children who experience fluctuating hearing loss as a result of recurrent ear infections are not diagnosed properly. Some of these children are assumed to have learning or behaviour problems. When hearing is problematic, children may show any or all of the following:

- fail to pay attention when spoken to;

Communication Matters: Hearing and Language cont'd

- give the wrong answers to simple questions;
- frequently ask for repetition of words or sentences;
- talk in an unusually soft or loud voice;
- turn up the television or CD player louder than usual;
- confuse sounds that are alike, and have problems with

- spelling and phonics;
- function below potential in school;
- be withdrawn and moody;
- have behaviour problems at home and at school.

If you or your child's teacher suspect that your child has a hearing problem, first visit your family doctor

or pediatrician. Ear infections require immediate treatment. Your doctor may then refer you to an Audiologist who will determine the severity of the hearing loss. Appropriate therapy objectives and teaching methods can then be identified.



Flu Shots



The flu season is just around the corner and it is time to get your free flu shot. Influenza (the flu) is a serious disease caused by a virus that affects the lungs. Approximately 1,500 people in Canada die each year from flu or its complications. The signs and symptoms of the flu are a

sudden high fever, headache, loss of appetite, severe muscle aches and pain, extreme fatigue, weakness, chills, dry cough, sore throat, runny nose, nasal congestion, sneezing and sweating. The flu virus is highly contagious and spreads easily from person to person.

to person. The flu shot is highly recommended for all people over 6 months of age, and especially those at high risk of complications related to contracting the flu. This includes children between 6 and 23 months of age, and those who have chronic medical conditions, such as emphysema, heart disease, cancer and diabetes. Getting a flu shot lowers your risk of getting sick from the flu and helps prevent the spread of the virus to others (especially the elderly and young children).

The Reading Nook— A Reading Magic Moment

Each day our students engage in a learning activity devoted to Working With Words. The purpose of this instructional block is to ensure that children read, spell, and use high-frequency words correctly, and that they learn the patterns necessary for decoding and spelling [DSBN]. Being able to read a large number of the high-frequency words allows for less decoding, more fluent reading, and increased comprehension. Your child is assigned a few of these high-frequency words to practice at home each week. There are a variety of ways to help your child learn to read and write the high-frequency words. On Wednesday, November 12th at 4:00 you will have the opportunity to attend a

Working With Words Workshop at Heximer. This workshop is specifically designed for the parents/guardians of kindergarten through grade 5 students. Please bring your school age child with you.
